The Good Earth

by Pearl S. Buck, 1931, about life in China in early 1900s

The kitchen was made of **earthen bricks** as the house was, great squares of earth **dug** from their own fields, and thatched with straw from their own wheat.

This was the **last morning** he would have to light the fire. ... There was a woman coming to the house... He could lie in his bed and wait, and he also would have a bowl of water brought to him...

He did not look at the woman as he spoke. It would not have been seemly.

The setting shows that the Chinese people at this time were farmers and relied on the soil for homes and food.

The plot shows that men in the Chinese culture at this time expected a woman to light the fire and bring food to them.

The character shows that men in Chinese culture at that time did not look directly at a woman. This shows the beliefs of Chinese men and women at that time.
